


Hi, my name is Dawn White, I'm Chichester District Council's Community Warden for

I act as a link between the community, the district council and other partners, including Sussex Police and housing providers. I can help with issues such as low-level anti-social behaviour, environmental issues

I was the Community Warden for Tangmere and Oving for the last 16 years, so I have lots of experience. I moved to cover this area after the very sad loss of Drew Allardice. I know he was much loved by those who new him and is very much missed. I have come from a very varied work background, including, working for the Citizens Advice Bureau as a voluntary advice worker, an Administration Officer in the prison service, a few different retail jobs, where I was a team leader/supervisor, a wages clerk, a baker and a door supervisor. Outside of work I have done a lot of community development work in the area where I live. I set up and ran a local Residents Association and was the events coordinator for a larger resident's group for many years. I am very cheerful by nature and like nothing more than to chat with people when they see me out and about, I'm from the Northeast of England and people often comment how friendly us Northerners are, so here is your chance to find out.

As your Community Warden I am a uniformed presence in your area and aim to:

• Be a friendly point of contact available to offer help and advice;

If I don't know the answer to your question - and sometimes I won't - or I can't solve your problem myself, don't worry, we can help you to find someone who can provide the advice and support you need.

• Make you feel safer by helping to reduce all kinds of crime and anti-social behaviour:

I will try to solve problems informally but, if that doesn't work, we will gather evidence and information, make statements to the Police and act as a professional witness. Although I don't have

powers of arrest or detention the I do helps to reduce crime and disorder.

- Look after and help to improve the local environment; I will monitor things like graffiti, abandoned cars and fly tipping ensuring that they are dealt with swiftly by the appropriate people.
- Make a positive difference in your local community;

 By working with the communities we work in, we can get to know the issues concerning local people and help to develop potential solutions in partnership with other organisations and the local community itself. We also work closely with local councils, schools, clubs, community organisations and local businesses We provide a link with the Police, District and County councils and registered social landlords.

WWPC - Pollinating our Parish!

WWPC is supporting local landowners and wildlife group to manage the area in a more gentle and sympathetic way to support biodiversity and climate change mitigation.

This Community Aspiration 12 is contained in the Village Neighbourhood Plan which was supported by 96% of residents that voted. Gardens are a large contributor to supporting insects and birds and everyone is being asked to do what they can to leave space for nature. There is a crisis with the huge loss of pollinators creating real problems for those growing food either farms or in our own gardens. Everyone has noticed the loss of bees and other insects which do the job of pollinating our crops and fruit trees. The decline in the number of Butterflies in 2024 is the worst on record. The Parish Council is managing its land so that some is left for insects, which in turn feed our birds and pollinate plants for us. Please think twice before getting out the spray and the strimmer. Your garden can become a haven for wildlife whilst creating a beautiful space. The MWHG pollinator highway diagram below shows what a difference everyone with a garden can make. The Neighbourhood Plan is also supporting biodiversity by requiring all new development to

provide a biodiversity net gain. This means that each applicant is asked to provide something to help such as a bird box or a new hedge with native plants or a new native tree. No Mow May is now well known but, as the situation is so serious perhaps try to leave it for longer than just May.



More affordable rented housing for West Wittering



Everyone will know that there are a further 70 dwellings being constructed at present on land off Church Road. One of the most

important benefits for a community is the provision of 35% of the dwellings being made affordable for local families. There are currently about 30 local West Wittering families looking for affordable rented housing in the village.

It came to the attention of the Parish Council in February that the provision of the affordable housing was at risk of not being made available. In particular the loss of those units which would remain low cost rent forever. The Parish Council has been working with the FG Woodger Trust and CDC to try and secure 10 of the dwellings to remain as low cost rented. Negotiations are ongoing and all parties hope to secure these much needed rented units for the village in the near future.

East Head Coastal Advisory Group (EHCIAG) Established 1997

This Group of experts now meet once a year in March to monitor the condition of the new bund that was constructed in 2022 on the hinge between West Wittering Estate and National Trust land.

This was a new form of natural sea defence to replace the old wooden breastworks and gabions which are no longer an acceptable form of sea defence to the Government Advisors, Natural England and the Environment Agency.

The Parish Council sits on the Advisory Group to represent the residents and is pleased to report that the bund is standing up well, despite the harsh environment. An added bonus is that a beautiful

new beach has formed as a result of the removal of the hard defences. West Wittering Estate has agreed to remove more of the gabions



around the bund area as they fail before they become a health and safety hazard.

The success of this form of Adaptive management to replace hard sea defences is being used as an example to other parts of the country and provides students with a working example of coastal geography now included in both O and A level curriculum resulting in many school parties visiting East Head each year for a great day out.

Parish Council Support...

Parish Council support charities and local organisations to help residents of West Wittering.

Every year West Wittering Parish Council helps organisations to support residents of the village by providing grants using its power under S137(1) of the Local Government Act. This power allows a Parish Council to incur expenditure which benefits residents of West Wittering when there is no other power that the Parish Council can use.
